

EVALUATE ADDATES SUNDAY 21 APRIL 2024 - EASTER 4 Acknowledgement of Country For thousands of years



For thousands of years the protocols of welcoming visitors from other lands and country has been practiced within Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

Yawarllaayi/Gomeroi elder Barbara Flick Nicol says "Aboriginal people are always aware if they are in another people's country, and especially talking about land in other's country. At first it was a principle for us – it wasn't expressly stated, but there was an understanding that there was a traditional protocol. If people wanted to (venture to other's lands) they would carry a message stick, asking properly. That was the protocol that they could meet. It's always been something that we did as a people, understanding and observing the fact that when you are in somebody else's country, that you acknowledge them."

As part of Australian society's journey towards reconciliation an Acknowledgement of Country began to be used around the time of the 1992 Mabo decision. In 2010, Federal Parliament made the decision to open each session with an Acknowledgement of the Ngunnawal Clan-Nation. Today it is official protocol to begin Parliament with the Lord's Prayer and an Acknowledgement of Country and on most public occasions for government, business, education, and health

acknowledgement, organisations, it is accepted protocol to begin with a Welcome by or Acknowledgement of the recognised traditional owners, the sovereign First Nation Peoples.

For the Uniting Church, we include an acknowledgement of country an important expression of the covenant which the Uniting Church in Australia has with the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress (UAICC), the Preamble to our Uniting Church in Australia Constitution, and the affirmation by the 15th Assembly in 2018 of Aboriginal and Islander Australians as sovereign peoples in this land.

In many ways we contextualise our worship for the 21st century, for our Australian context, and for our community while honouring the rich traditions of church worship over the last two millennia. When we include an acknowledgement of country at the beginning of worship, we are contextualising our worship and deeply honouring the ancient customs of this land, while also demonstrating our commitment to covenant with the first peoples here today. We also do not use the common secular but instead acknowledge our first peoples in our Christian context and theology.

When I was ordained, I was charged with affirming and committing myself to the covenant made between the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress and the Uniting Church and to accept the obligation to serve both First and Second peoples. As part of that commitment, I will always begin worship with an acknowledgement of country as it's the least I can do to honour this covenant.

Book Review Gulliver's Wife by Lauren Chater



This spinoff story from Jonathan Swift's Travels is a carefully researched and thoughtfully imagined tale, for general readership, of the original Lemuel Gulliver's near invisible wife.

Mary Gulliver's is a London midwife trying hard to keep her home and children intact and thriving, while her husband and children's father is having an adventurous life abroad. But then, after three years away he returns home much changed and with fanciful stories of his adventures. From then things begin to fall apart.

London in the 1700s was not a safe place for ordinary women and children. Crime and disease were rife. Women and children were considered the property of husbands and fathers. In Gulliver's absence, Mary had established a life for herself as a well respected midwife. She worked during the day to monitor pregnancies and was available at any time of the day or night to attend to births. Mary and her sister midwives had inherited a body of knowledge about plants and their medieval uses. Mary maintained a herb garden to provide for the potents to treat all manner of health related issues. Such knowledge was passed on to the apprentice midwives.

The book describes some intriguing material about the historical status of midwives, the power of the church and the ongoing attempts on the part of the male medical fraternity to disempower midwives and devalue their work. The story is illustrated by many examples of living in poverty in a port town in the 18th century.

Session 2. Taking the Bible Seriously.



FOCUS: The authority one places in the Bible plays a critical role in one's worldview and understanding of the Christian life.

The Bible's influence has been recognized for centuries. It has been quoted and misquoted, used and abused, appealed to and discredited. Biblical texts have also been used to oppress women, support slavery, justify wars, and today, bolster White Supremacy and other discriminatory movements.

Preachers try to bring the texts alive; classes and small groups provide vital places of discovery. Personal study allows the Bible to speak to an individual's situation. But what is it exactly that we're looking for? The Bible is so big, so intimidating, it's difficult to know where to start. It's often hard to know what to believe or what not to believe.

The LtQ studies have been a great help for many in answering these questions saving many from abandoning their Christian faith and Church. It is also a great help in speaking about the Gospel to the secular world in words that can be understood.
